Book series on semiotics in the world and Tartu Semiotics Library

Abstract. We publish a worldwide list of 33 recent semiotics book series, and describe the volumes published in the Tartu Semiotics Library series that was established in 1998.

Keywords: history of semiotics; bibliography of semiotics

When Kristian Bankov asked the bibliophile Umberto Eco during an interview before the World Semiotics Congress in Sofia in 2014 what message he would like to send to the congress, the reply was sharp and laconic: "Preserve the paper!" – that is, one should continue printing books on paper. Thus, a semiotics library of hard copies is important. The assembly of the semiotics library at the University of Tartu was begun by the then head of department Igor Černov immediately after the founding of the Semiotics Department at the University in 1993. Now, after the incorporation of Thomas A. Sebeok's Memorial Library and the Uexküll Archive, and with numerous new acquisitions being added to the collection every year, we are proud to have a remarkably rich collection of semiotic literature in Tartu. In this context, it seems rather natural that a book series published at the Department of Semiotics should bear the name of Tartu Semiotics Library.

Book series on semiotics in the world

The publication landscape of journals and series is dynamic: some become discontinued, as new ones appear. The review of semiotics journals of the world compiled a decade ago (Kull, Maran 2013) would already require an update: for

instance, the Lithuanian journal *Semiotika* was not listed, *Digital Age in Semiotics* and *Communication* published from Bulgaria did not exist yet, and so on. Concerning books, we compiled a worldwide list and analysis of introductory and general textbooks on semiotics (Kull *et al.* 2015) some years ago. Here, we focus on book series.

Once, there was the legendary "orange" book series *Approaches to Semiotics*, edited by Thomas Sebeok (co-editors Alain Rey and Roland Posner), that was published from 1969 to 1997 by Mouton de Gruyter and includes 127 volumes. It was followed by a short (seven volumes) series *Approaches to Applied Semiotics* (2000–2009) by the same publisher, edited by Thomas Sebeok and Jean Umiker-Sebeok. Since 2009, De Gruyter's main semiotic book series has borne the name *Semiotics*, *Communication and Cognition*; it is edited by Paul Cobley and Kalevi Kull.

There have been several important book series on semiotics (see the detailed list in Withalm 2004, and also Voigt 2008: 287), which have ceased publication, for instance Semiotic and Cognitive Studies (series editors Umberto Eco and Patrizia Violi, published by Brepols, 14 volumes between 1995 and 2004), Toronto Studies in Semiotics and Communication (series editors Marcel Danesi, Umberto Eco, Paul Perron, Roland Posner and Peter Schultz, published by University of Toronto Press, 24 volumes between 1994 and 2010), Semiotics and Informatics (Семиотика и информатика, series editor Vladimir Uspenskij, 37 volumes between 1971 and 2002), or the ones edited by Jeff Bernard, or Walter Koch, etc.

Hereby we attempt to compile an updated list of semiotics book series in the world. Since the boundaries of semiotics are rather ambiguous, there exist many book series that only partly identify themselves as belonging to semiotics (referring to, for instance, communication studies, cognitive studies, linguistics, cultural studies). Therefore, we decided to limit our list to those series that explicitly indicate semiotics in their name. Obviously, several may have been left unnoticed by us, especially those published in languages other than English, for which we apologize. The list includes only the series that have been active during the last decade.

Acta Semiotica Fennica (series editor Eero Tarasti). Published by the Semiotic Society of Finland (and formerly by the International Semiotics Institute). Established in 1992, about 40 volumes.

Berkeley Insights in Linguistics and Semiotics (series editor Irmengard Rauch). Peter Lang. Established in 1989, over 100 volumes published.

Biblioteca/Semiotica (series editor Gianfranco Marrone). Meltemi. Since 2018, 14 volumes.

- Bibliotheca Lotmaniana. Tallinn University Press. Established in 2010, 10 volumes. Biosemiotics (series editors Kalevi Kull, Alexei Sharov, Donald Favareau, and Claus Emmeche). Springer. Established in 2007, over 20 volumes.

- *Semiotics, Communication and Cognition* (series editors Paul Cobley and Kalevi Kull). De Gruyter Mouton. Established in 2009. Over 30 volumes published.
- Semiotics of Religion (series editors Massimo Leone, Fabio Rambelli and Robert Yelle). De Gruyter. Established in 2019, 5 volumes.
- *Semiotics, Signs of the Times* (series editor Dinda L. Gorlée). Brill. A new series opened in 2022, volumes in preparation.
- *Sémiotique et philosophie de la musique* (series editor Joseph-François Kremer). L'Harmattan. Since 1999, 30 volumes.
- *Tartu Semiotics Library* (series editors Kalevi Kull, Silvi Salupere, Peeter Torop). University of Tartu Press. Established in 1998, 23 volumes published.

It can be noticed that most of these series – 21 from among 33 – were established in the last two decades. Whether this can be interpreted as a symptom of growing interest in semiotics would require further analysis. The total number of volumes published in the series included in the list above exceeds 700.

Volumes of the series Tartu Semiotics Library

The idea for the name of this book series came from Mihhail Lotman. The first volume was published by the University of Tartu Press in 1998. A necessity for our own book series arose largely from teaching needs. The first volume (Ivanov *et al.* 1998) provided Estonian and English translations of the classic theses on the semiotics of culture – an obligatory text in semiotics classes. An updated and commented version was published as Volume 13 (Salupere, Torop, Kull 2013).

The second volume is the dictionary of concepts of the Tartu–Moscow School of Semiotics (Levchenko, Salupere 1999). The third volume includes, among other, related material, a brief description of key concepts and terms of biosemiotics (Emmeche, Kull, Stjernfelt 2002). The fourth volume offers an updated edition of *Basics of Semiotics*, together with an Estonian translation (Deely 2005).

Volumes 5, 6, 7 and 9 are monographs by Estonian semioticians (Grishakova 2006; Lepik 2007, 2008; Randviir 2010), while Volumes 18 and 23 are collectively authored books based on research projects carried out in Tartu (Maran *et al.* 2016; Sütiste *et al.* 2021). Volume 16 is a product of the doctoral seminar of the Department of Semiotics (Rodríguez Higuera, Bennett 2016).

Volumes 8, 12, 14, 15, 17, 21 and 22 are monographs authored by scholars with a geographical range all over the world (El-Hani, Queiroz, Emmeche 2009; Merrell 2013; Danesi, Bockarova 2014; Gorlée 2015; Robinson 2016; Tymoczko 2021; Prodi 2021), while Volumes 3, 10 and 19 (Emmeche, Kull, Stjernfelt 2002; Favareau, Cobley, Kull 2012; Favareau 2018) serve as Festschriften – to Jesper Hoffmeyer and Charles Goodwin.

Two volumes (11 and 20) describe recent developments in biosemiotics and are based on materials from Gatherings in Biosemiotics (Rattasepp, Bennett 2012; Lacková, Rodríguez Higuera, Kull 2020).

Altogether 23 different volumes (plus additional editions of Deely's and Grishakova's books) have been published in the period 1998–2022. From among these, 15 are monographs, and eight are edited collections.

Most volumes (20) are in English, while two (Vols. 6 and 9, Lepik 2007 and Randviir 2010, respectively) have been published in Estonian. There is also an English-Estonian bilingual edition (Vol. 4, Deely 2005, separately printed in an updated version as Vols. 4.1, Deely 2009a, and 4.2, Deely 2009b). One volume has appeared in Russian (Vol. 2, Levchenko, Salupere 1999), and there are also two English-Estonian-Russian trilingual volumes: Ivanov *et al.* 1998 (Vol. 1), and Salupere, Torop, Kull 2013 (Vol. 13).
