## PREFACE

The following list of Americanisms is intended for the use of those who wish to read contemporary American novels, journals, and similar literature, and who find that even the standard dictionaries, both of American and of British provenience, do not afford the assistance that they need. The list is based on extensive original collections. Much valuable assistance in defining meanings was derived from the following publications:

Users will do well to bear in mind that many of the words listed have additional or more original meanings in Standard English not recorded here.

No attempt has been made to assign each word to its particular sphere, and to state whether it belongs to the colloquial idiom, to slang, or to vulgar speech, or whether it is a provincialism.

The pronunciation has been indicated in exceptional cases only. The number of illustrative quotations has been reduced to a minimum.

The American mode of spelling has been adhered to as far as possible.

Words and expressions of American origin that have definitely passed into British English (such as *caucus* and the political meaning of *platform*) have not been included.
